

## LEARN ABOUT OUR WILDLIFE



### *American Bison*

Bison, or buffalo as they are more commonly known, can stand up to 6.5 feet tall and weigh over a ton. Our herd arrived from South Dakota in the late 1920s and are known as symbolic animals of the Great Plains.



### *Elk*

Elk are also called wapiti, a Native American word that means “white rump.” Elk are related to deer but are much larger. A bull (male) elk’s antlers may reach 4 feet above its head, making him up to nine feet tall.



### *Fallow Deer*

These small European deer can be black, white, or fawn colored with spots. Bucks grow small spike-like antlers in the first few years of their life, then broad shovel-shaped (palmate) antlers typically when they reach four years of age.



### *Highland Cattle*

Originally from Scotland, these distinctive cattle have long shaggy double coats and sharp horns.



### *Llama*

The llama is a South American relative of the camel, though the llama does not have a hump.



### *Longhorn Cattle*

These large cattle have multi-colored coats and distinctive long horns which can grow up to ten feet tip to tip.



### *Ostrich*

The flightless ostrich is the world’s largest bird. It can grow as tall as nine feet and weigh up to 350 pounds. This swift bird has two toes on each foot.



### *Sika Deer*

Sika are Japanese deer with antlers that usually have less than five points per side. They are profusely spotted with white in warmer weather, changing to a blackish brown in winter.



### *Water Buffalo*

These large bovine animals can weigh up to 2,500 pounds. 95% of their population can be found in Asia. During warm months, they spend most of their days in the water.



### *Zebra*

Zebras are equine animals known for their black and white stripes. Like fingerprints, a zebra’s stripes are unique. No two patterns are exactly alike.

Trail has some rocky & rough terrain

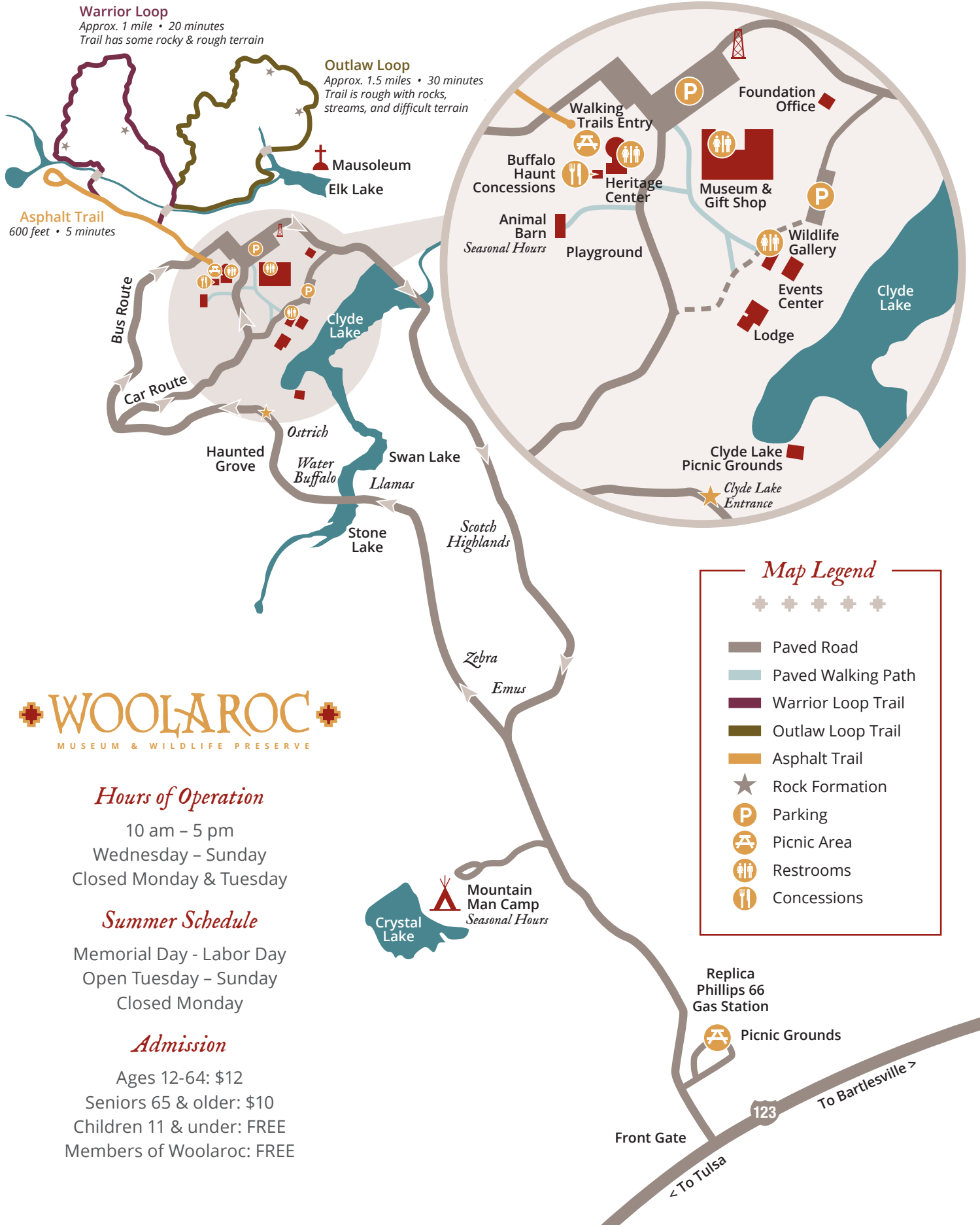
**Outlaw Loop**
